In the spring of 2006 I gave a public reading with Di Brandt at Red Deer College. The purpose of the reading was to celebrate Di Brandt's completion of her Writer-In-Residence stay at Red Deer College and to advertise my role as Writer-In-Residence there in the spring of 2007.

In the fall of 2005 I went on a six city reading tour to promote my new book of fiction, <u>So It Won't Go Away</u></u>. I gave readings in Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton, Kelowna and Vernon. I am hoping to read in Vancouver and Victoria this spring. Though it is sometimes difficult to assess the results of such tours, a very positive result was that I sold out the first run of this book, and the 2nd Edition of <u>So It Won't Go Away</u> is being released this January. And my last book, <u>Monet's Garden</u>, is in its 3nd Edition...so I feel that even though I live away from the centres of Canadian publishing, I am still managing to reach a modest reading public.

Over the past three years, with the help of Marion Barschel, I have developed a reading series broadcast on CBC Radio, Kelowna, during the summer months. These have been eight-segment reading spots aired on CBC's morning show, DayBreak, and they have featured both BC writers and, also, our own Okanagan College Creative Writing students. I am hoping that this reading series will now be a continuing summer project, and I am hoping, even further, that I can get our students involved in the actual production aspects of this project.

Since 1984 I have given Canada Council Readings of my poetry/prose in these cities: Regina, Saskatoon, Edmonton, Calgary, Vancouver, Victoria, Duncan, Nelson, Castlegar, Kamloops, Kelowna, Penticton, Salmon Arm and have, over the years, been interviewed on CBC Radio (regionally, provincially and nationally) and CKUA. In Europe I gave three public readings: in Paris, as one of twelve international poets participating in Festival Franco-Anglaises de Poesie in May 1988; in St. Ives, England, as part of The St. Ives Literary Festival, September 1988; in Strasbourg, with Glen Sorestad, at Arts Sans Frontieres, The Evelyne Helmlinger Gallerie, September 1988.

In The United States, Tom Wayman, Genni Gunn and myself were invited readers at The Associated Writing Program's Annual General Meeting in Portland, Oregon, in the Spring, 1998.

I am also a singer/songwriter and have written songs that have been recorded or performed by my trio, Lent/Fraser/Wall in our CD <u>Shadow Moon</u> (summer 2005) and by Laura Vinson, The Lent Brothers, Gary Fjellgaard, Scotty Kushner. I perform in a jazz/roots trio here in the Okanagan--- The Lent, Fraser, Wall Trio---where we perform concerts or open for artists such as Bill Henderson, Roy Forbes, Long John Baldry, Campbell Ryga, Leahey and Chilliwack.
